
## ECCO IBD Nurses (NECCO)

### Reported nurses competences

- Integration in the multidisciplinary team.
- Liaison with the patient, The team and primary care.
- Disease control.
- · Adherence to treatment control.
- Early detection of adverse effects.
- Health education to patients and their families.
- Physical and emotional support.
- · Being accessible when patients require.
- Organization of support groups.

### Reported nurses skills

- Availability.
- · Communication skills.
- Kindness.
- Sympathy.
- Giving confidence to cope with the disease.

### **Discussion/conclusions:**

Numerous conceptual and operational competences have been identified. They usually refer to roles within the multidisciplinary team, with the patient, and in the relationship between patient, team, and even with primary care. Nurse competences aim not only to improve the physical condition of patients, but also emotional aspects affecting personal, family, social, and labour areas. Studies for understanding the relationship between competences and skills of nurses, and the quality of care and the efficient use of resources in managing IBD, would be desirable.
